

person to purchase a new home from a home builder if:



- (b) The home has not been enrolled with the NHBRC
- (c) The relevant fees have not been paid to the NHBRC

If a home is less than five years old at the time of being sold, the conveyancing attorneys must obtain the necessary NHBRC enrolment certificate from the seller.

# The benefits of enrolment



All homes must be enrolled at least 15 days before construction begins. Not all builders will take on the responsibility of enrolling a home, because an enrolment fee is payable.

PLEASE NOTE: This is a common oversight. Confirm that your home is enrolled as, ultimately, this is the homeowner's responsibility.

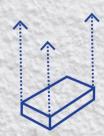


NHBRC enrolment certificates are valid for five years from the date of occupation.

If the NHBRC for any reason cannot determine the date of occupation, the date reflected on the certificate of occupancy issued by the city council will be taken as the date.

## This means the NHBRC can ensure that your builder rectifies any defects, including

- Minor defects found in the first three months
- Any roof leaks found in the first twelve months
- Major structural defects found in the first five years



## You have the right to a second opinion.

You may ask your builder to request inspections from the NHBRC (the cost of these inspections is included in your enrolment fee).

These inspections can be used to check the following:

- Foundations
- Roof height (super structure)
- Practical completion (includes roof)
- Storm water (drainage)
- Carpentry
- Plumbing
- Electrical
- Waterproofing
